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Have your meeting and at the same time take the opportunity to update your map. New neighbours come and go; welcome newcomers and give them the chance to become a member and reap the rewards of Block Watch.

Two very important pieces of information that we find are commonly changed with annual map updating are e-mail addresses and phone numbers.

Reporting Crime: the Hows and Whys

There are many good reasons for reporting a crime.

- You or someone else may need protection from the person who committed the crime.
- It can help to protect you, your loved ones and community from future crimes.
- It can give you an opportunity to deal with the harm done to you or others.
- When police are called as soon as a crime has been suspected, there is a better chance of arresting the person responsible.
- Your report may stop someone from committing another crime.

If you do see a crime, it's the type of crime that determines the way you report it. You would call 911 to report any crime that is in progress and requires immediate action, to either render assistance or apprehend suspects. These would include:

- Break and Enter in progress
- Armed Robbery
- Shooting



- Stabbing
- Assault
- •All crimes where lives are in jeopardy
- Physical disturbances
- Injury accidents
- Prowlers
- •Any crime being witnessed.

Use the non-emergency number (250-475-4321) when calling about any crime after it has occurred where there is no suspect present or minor incident complaints where time is not a critical issue. These would include:

- · thefts.
- property damage
- Non- injury motor vehicle accidents
- Inquiries or Information
- Suspicious activity
- noise complaints




